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# MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR

## Hockey in Alberta is changing.

Participants, parents, minor hockey associations, and other groups and individuals involved in the sport have new expectations. Concerns are being expressed about cost, travel, schedule flexibility, and other longstanding aspects of the sport. For our members, and for the hockey community in Alberta, the old way of doing things is no longer acceptable.

The result is that Hockey Alberta has to be prepared to look at new and exciting ways of providing the programs and services that support amateur hockey in the province. Because, from the perspective of the Board of Directors, the members are always right.

In last year's annual report, we referred to 2013-14 as a year of change. I would describe 2014-15 as a year of transition as we finalized the implementation of the new organizational model for Hockey Alberta. We have worked towards establishing a core of volunteers who are confident in their roles and responsibilities in setting the new direction for hockey in the province.

And now, Hockey Alberta is on the cusp of making the system work much better than it has in the past, and in a way that benefits the entire hockey community.

At the 2013 Alberta Hockey Summit, participants told us that our number one focus needed to be on the player. Over the past two years, that message has been at the forefront in helping set the direction for the organization. To that end, the Board of Directors, along with senior staff and key volunteers, spent significant time in 2014-15 reviewing the Vision and Mission statements for Hockey Alberta.

Hockey Alberta is ready to have those key statements reflect the importance of ensuring that we meet the needs of our players in the province, regardless of age, experience, skill or location. This new focus will have a significant impact on potentially everything from strategic planning to recruitment, scheduling, registration processes and provincial championships. It will help us attract new participants to the game and, in the end, will help ensure that hockey in Alberta not only remains viable, but increases in popularity.

It will be exciting, and challenging, and in the long run, it will make a difference.

I would like to thank my fellow members of the Board of Directors for their hard work during the past year, and their commitment to setting this new course for Hockey Alberta. As a Board, we have been willing to look at new challenges, and we recognize that we need to be more available to the membership. We were successful in doing some of that this year, and there will be more opportunities to interact with the Board in the coming year.



I would also like to extend a sincere thank you to our extensive group of volunteers. Without you, Hockey Alberta would not have achieved the successes it has to date. And I would like to recognize and thank the staff in the office in Red Deer, and in the Regional Centres across the province.

As Board Chair, I am proud of everyone who has grown into the "Hockey Alberta family".

# **OPERATIONS OVERVIEW**

It was a busy and exciting year for Hockey Alberta, starting with the Annual General Meeting and Hockey Conference in Edmonton in June 2014, where we kicked off the year by continuing to discuss the player-first themes that had emerged from the Alberta Hockey Summit.

The Hockey Conference and AGM helped set the tone for the year, as Hockey Alberta worked towards the six priorities identified in our Business Plan.

As we look forward to 2015-16, we will continue to work towards creating a better experience in the game for people across the province.

## Those priorities, along with some of the achievements in 2014-15, are listed below:

#### 1. Hockey Alberta Purpose/Identity

- Operated a hockey conference, in conjunction with the annual general meeting
- · Identified a need to review the Vision and Mission statements

### 2. Hockey Delivery System

- Continued to develop a new Hockey Delivery Model that includes options for all players, at any level, regardless of age, skill or experience.
- Reviewed the structure of Female Hockey, receiving Board of Directors approval to undertake significant changes to the current structure.
- Approved recommendations to create a new structure at the AA level for Peewee, Bantam and Midget players.
- Worked with Minor Hockey Leagues towards a more unified system of league play with consistent rules across the province.
- Encouraged new players to try hockey, through Bauer First Shift program offerings, while continuing our Pond Hockey program.
- Reviewed and built a plan to launch Province-wide guidelines for Minor Hockey Associations with regard to implementing a focused Initiation program.

### 3. Improve Participant Experience

 Recruited Coach Directors for each Minor Hockey Association, with a Coach Director session included at the Hockey Conference.

### 4. People Capacity/Alignment

- Approved the Operations Advisory Committee Terms of Reference.
- Completed the second year of recruiting volunteers for our core operational committees.

#### 5. Organizational Partnerships

 With the successful bid of the 2019 Canada Winter Games, a new facility will be built at Red Deer College. The facility will eventual house Hockey Alberta's office, some programs, and future events.

#### 6. Operational Excellence

- Distributed and completed our first Customer Satisfaction survey of all participants to gain feedback on their hockey experiences in 2014-15.
- Reported to the Board of Directors in four primary areas: Customer Satisfaction, Financial Sustainability, Organizational Outcomes, and Workforce Alignment.

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# PROVINCIAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

## The March to a provincial championship



Six months of regular season and tournament action, including up to six weeks of provincial playdown action culminated in March with the 2015 Hockey Alberta Provincial Championships.

Tournament action determined the majority of the 2015 provincial champions. Fourteen titles were awarded on March 15, and 18 on March

22, with several other champs crowned on March 29 and April 5. As well, Junior A and AAA league champions also claimed provincial titles to accompany their league crowns.

Host communities for provincial championship tournaments in 2015 were: Beaverlodge, Big Valley, Bow Island, Calgary, Camrose, Caroline, Daysland, Devon, Edmonton, Edson, Grande Prairie, Lac La Biche, Lacombe, Leduc, Lethbridge, Mayerthorpe, Red Deer, Ponoka, Kneehill, Olds, Sexsmith, Sherwood Park, Stettler, Stony Plain, Tofield, Vermilion, Viking, and Warburg.



In addition to the on-ice action, several communities participated in the second year of the Tundra True Spirit of Hockey Day, a partnership between Tundra Process Solutions Ltd. and Hockey Alberta to celebrate a shared love for hockey and the community that supports the sport. Participating communities in 2015 were: Bow Island, Caroline, Lacombe, Mayerthorpe, Olds, Ponoka, Sexsmith, Viking, and Warburg.

# Silver and Bronze at the Canada Winter Games







The Team Alberta Under-16 Male squad earned the silver medal, going unbeaten until the gold medal match, where they suffered a 3-1 loss to Team Ontario. It was Alberta's fourth silver medal, winning previously in 1971, 1991 and 1995. Alberta advanced to the finals with a 3-1 semi-final win over Manitoba, and round-robin victories over Quebec, Nova Scotia and Saskatchewan.

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# HOCKEY DEVELOPMENT

## A busy year behind the bench

Coaches in Alberta received some special recognition during the 2014-15 season, as Hockey Alberta unveiled the Coach of the Month program.

More than 300 parents, players and Local Minor Hockey Association executives submitted nominations for the Coach of the Month, which was presented from September to March. Coach of the Month recipients were Chris Levesque (Fort McMurray), Blain Shackleton (Medicine Hat), Curtis Belton (Bowden), Jason Schuller (Edmonton), Charles Bullee (Sedgewick), Ian Barnett (Sundre), and Allyson Bendfeld (Red Deer).

The 2014-2015 season marked a busy year for coach certification as many changes to course content and delivery created new and more efficient ways to educate and develop coaches. The Coach Level clinic is in its third year offering an online component which allows for a more practical focus on skills-based instruction and an emphasis on the onice component of clinics.

Hockey Development and Regional Centre staff members were busy during the year, with more than 17,000 participants completing NCCP and Hockey Canada coach clinics. That included more than 6,000 parents and 4,700 coaches who completed Respect in Sport, and almost 1,600 coaches who completed the mandatory Checking Skills clinic. The checking clinic emphasized basic checking skills and the importance of having players develop confidence, respect and an awareness of the checking process.

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As well, more than 750 coaches participated in 61 NCCP Instructional Stream Coach Clinics – including Developing Defencemen, Skills Level 1, Skating Level 1, Goaltending Level 1 and Small Area Games – offered in conjunction with Hockey Alberta's Regional Centres.

These courses are offered to coaches in Alberta free of charge and are delivered by Hockey Alberta trained instructors. The clinics consist of classroom and on-ice instruction, and have been developed to offer coaches a practical session on teaching skills and tactics. This approach allows coaches to further educate themselves on the skill development of their players.

Planning is already underway for 2015-16, as an NCCP High Performance 1 Seminar will be held in Camrose in July in conjunction with the Team Alberta Male Elite Development Camp. The seminar has a full registration of 36 delegates who will learn from professional speakers in sessions on topics such as special teams, yearly planning, offensive/defensive individual tactics, offensive/defensive team play systems, goaltending, and ethical decision making.

# Inaugural Peewee Prospects Cup joins the Team Alberta program

More than 750 athletes born in 2002 ushered in a new era for the Team Alberta program, as they attended zone tryouts in April to participate in the inaugural ATB Peewee Prospects Cup.

From the tryouts, 160 players were selected to compete in the tournament in Olds in May, and Edmonton Green captured the first championship crown, 4-2, over South Black in the A Final.

The Peewee Prospects Cup culminated a busy couple of months for Team Alberta, which included the ATB Alberta Cup and the ATB Alberta Challenge at the end of April. Those events were preceded by several weekends of zone tryout selection camps, as well as the application and selection process to establish coaching and support staff for each team.

The focus of the Team Alberta program is to identify up and coming players who eventually could compete in events such as the Canada Winter Games. All three events also identify interested coaches, trainers, coach mentors, officials and administrators who are interested in working at higher levels of competition.

In Medicine Hat, the North Predators were crowned champions of the ATB Alberta Challenge, defeating the South Lightning, 2-1, in the A final. The six-team Challenge featured the top 120 female players born in 2001-02. They were selected from more than 300 players who attended zone selection camps. They were also competing for one of 60 invites to the U16 Female Provincial Camp in July. The Team Alberta Female program is a four-year progression that begins at the ATB Alberta Challenge, a U16 age level event, and progresses to the U18 level.

And in Canmore, Calgary South won the Alberta Cup title for the third time, defeating South, 4-3. The ATB Alberta Cup is the premier event in the province that helps identify the top male players in Alberta. It is well attended by scouts as they prepare for the Western Hockey League's bantam draft.

The eight-team tournament featured the top 160 male players born in 2000, who were selected from more than 700 who attended zone selection camps. Alberta Cup competitors were competing for one of 80 invites to the U16 Male Provincial Camp in July in Camrose. The 2000-born athletes will also be the group representing Alberta at the Western Canada Challenge Cup taking place in Calgary in October.

# **OFFICIALS**

# Officials working hard locally, provincially, nationally and internationally

For the Hockey Alberta Referee's Council, 2014-15 was a busy and successful season.

The Council had an increase of 150 officials registered compared to the previous year, and development, supervision and mentoring, and clinic programs continued to grow with a focus of increasing retention rates from year-to-year.

Development programs utilized the ATB Alberta Cup (Canmore) and ATB Alberta Challenge (Medicine Hat) tournaments. Officials were selected out of the zone camps for each of the events that are held across the province. Twelve male officials worked in Canmore and eight female officials worked in Medicine Hat, officiating some of the top 2000-01 born players in the province.

Supervision and Mentorship programs continued to assist new officials, with most of the Level 1 and new Level 2 officials across the province receiving feedback and support from senior officials. Mentorship is a significant area for the Referee's Council, as the group looks at new ways of providing feedback to help officials do the job required and prepare them for tough situations that occur.

The Clinic program worked on a couple of pilot projects in the Edmonton area, including one clinic of purely new Level 1 officials held in conjunction with a Minor Hockey Association's novice tryouts. New officials worked the games with mentors, and all officials not working sat in the stands with instructors and supervisors to see the game from a little different perspective. Officials who attended this clinic are being tracked for their progress, and the goal is to have as high a return rate as possible from this group of new officials. Similar clinics are being planned for this year.

Hockey Alberta officials were selected to work at international, national and regional events.

At the international level, several Alberta officials were selected to represent Canada:

- Lacey Senuk, a Level IV referee from St. Albert, was selected to work the World Women's U18 championship in Buffalo, New York in January.
- Chris Carlson of Edmonton was named to the long list to officiate at the 2015 IIHF Ice Hockey World Championship in the Czech Republic.
- Colin Watt and Fraser Lawrence were named to the referee crew working the World Junior A Challenge in Kindersley, Sask. Sean Donnelly was also named as a linesman.

At the national level, Hockey Canada selected five officials to work at the 2015 Canadian Interuniversity Sport (CIS) national championships in March: Tyler Adair (men's tournament in Halifax); Senuk (referee, CIS Women's Nationals in Calgary); and Shannon Kline, Erica Holmes and Alana Cabana (lines, CIS Women's Nationals)

The Esso Cup Canadian midget girls' championship in Red Deer was staffed by an impressive crew of Alberta officials. Referees were Michelle Barry and Erica Holmes of Calgary, Carrie Keller of Lethbridge and Jessica Trombley of Sherwood Park. Linesmen were Alana Cabana and Cassandra Gregory of Edmonton, Ashley Schneider of Leduc, Jacqueline Fitz and Shannon Kline of Calgary and Megan French of Lethbridge.

As well, five referees and 10 linesmen officiated at the Keystone Cup Western Canadian Junior B championship in Cold Lake in April. Referees were Steven Cousens, Beau Gavin, Brent Ramsay, Brad Shura and Daniel Gadowski. Linesmen were Clayton Brown, Cedric Erzinger, Craig Morrow, Justin Geeraert, Mason Stewart, Will Moss, Devin Kohlhauser, George Hart, Taylor Burzminski and Greg Lightburn.







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# NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

# Three medals for Alberta teams on the national stage

Teams representing Alberta on the national stage in 2015 brought home one national championship, two second place, and one fourth-place finish.

The University of Alberta Golden Bears won their second consecutive Canadian Interuniversity Sport (CIS) National Championship, defeating the University of New Brunswick in the final in Halifax. After finishing the 2014-15 regular season with a 24-4-0 record, the Golden Bears blew past competition at the nationals, defeating St. Francis Xavier (STFX) University and Universite du Quebec a Trois-Rivieres (UQTR) to earn a berth in the finals, where they defeated the Varsity Reds, 6-3.

The Bentley Generals captured the silver medal in the Allan Cup (Senior Male AAA). The Generals made the trek across country to Clarenville, Newfoundland and Labrador, as they competed in their third consecutive Allan Cup. Bentley entered the tournament having lost only three games all season. In Clarenville, they defeated the host Caribous and Lameque Au P'tit Mousse in round-robin action, and then edged the Grand Falls-Windsor Cataracts in overtime to earn a spot in finals against Manitoba's South East Prairie Thunder on April 13. The Thunder held on for a 2-0 victory to win the Allan Cup, with Bentley returning home with the silver medal.

The Red Deer Midget AAA Female Chiefs earned the silver medal at the Esso Cup (Midget Female AAA), and set a record in the process, becoming the first host team in the history of the tournament to qualify for the championship game. Two teams represented Alberta at the Esso Cup, as the provincial champion Edmonton Thunder (they defeated Red Deer in the provincial final) defeated Prince George, B.C. to qualify as the Pacific representative. In round-robin action, Red Deer finished third and qualified for the semi-finals with a 3-2 record, with wins over Moncton Rockets, Edmonton Thunder and Central Plain Capitals (Manitoba). Edmonton, meanwhile, finished with a 1-3-1 record, missing the playoffs. In the semi-final, Red Deer scored the only goal in the shootout against Saskatoon to avenge an earlier loss in round-robin and advance to gold medal match. In the final, Red Deer lost 2-1 to the Sudbury Lady Wolves, earning the silver medal in front of a large crowd in the Red Deer Arena.

The Strathmore UFA Bisons finished fourth in the Telus Cup (Midget Male AAA). The Bisons were the first Strathmore team to ever qualify for the Telus Cup, and they actually defeated the eventual champions, Toronto Young Nationals, 5-3, during round-robin play. However, the Bisons finished with a 3-4 record, good for fourth overall. Their other wins came over the tournament hosts, Albatros du College Notre-Dame, and Nova Scotia's Newbridge Academy.

Two Alberta teams competed in this year's CIS Women's National Championships. The University of Calgary hosted the event, while the University of Alberta Pandas also qualified as the Canada West representatives.






# POND HOCKEY AND MORE

## More chances to try hockey

Athletes in Alberta had more opportunities to try out the sport of hockey, or to participate at a non-competitive level, in 2014-15.

Pond Hockey celebrated its 11th anniversary as a Hockey Alberta program area by welcoming nine new member communities, and approximately 700 new participants.

New Pond Hockey groups this year included Airdrie, Bow Island, Bow Valley, Grande Cache, Mallaig, Sherwood Park, St. Albert, St. Paul, and Strathcona. Registration numbers increased from 2,702 to 3,418, an increase of about 21 per cent.

Pond Hockey embraces the concepts of fun, skill development and family involvement in a less structured environment. Pond Hockey Host Groups determine the age divisions and structure depending of their individual needs; however, body checking has been eliminated.

Pond Hockey is not intended to replace the competitive and recreational programs already offered by Minor Hockey Associations. Rather, Pond Hockey is intended as another opportunity for youth to play hockey and, in some cases, utilize outdoor ice as a venue.

Pond Hockey host groups include: Airdrie, Athabasca, Banff, Bonnyville, Bow Island, Bow Valley, Calmar, Carstairs, CFB Suffield, Chestermere, Cochrane, Daysland, Drayton Valley, Edson, Elk Point, Fort McKay, Fort Saskatchewan, Gleichen, Grande Cache, High Prairie, Jasper, Mallaig, Mundare, Oilfields, Peace Smoky, Priddis, Red Deer, Sherwood Park, St Albert, St Paul, Standard, Stavely, Strathcona, Thorsby and Wainwright.

Hockey Alberta has the mandate of getting as many kids on the ice as possible, and Pond Hockey provides an opportunity for those looking for an alternative that is affordable, less structured and requires relaxed commitment.

Meanwhile, Alberta youth interested in getting into hockey, but unable for financial or other reasons got that chance through the Bauer First Shift program launched in 2014 by Bauer and Hockey Canada. More than 25 programs were offered across Canada, with a goal of adding one million new players to the sport over the next decade.

In Alberta, Bauer First shift programs were held in Lethbridge, Calgary, Red Deer and Edmonton for boys and girls, ages 6-10 who have never registered in hockey before. The program included six on-ice sessions, and each player outfitted from head to toe with Bauer gear including: helmet combo and facemask, shoulder and elbow pads, base layer top and neck guard, jersey, pants, socks, shin guards, jock/jill under protective shorts, gloves, stick and skates.

#### Al Hamilton (Achievement)


Memorial Cup winner, National Hockey League and World Hockey Association player, member of Team Canada versus Russia in 1974.

#### 1979-80 Red Deer Rustlers (Achievement):


Centennial Cup Canadian Junior A champions, the second title in the franchise's history.

## ALBERTA HOCKEY HALL OF FAME

In early 2015, the Hockey Alberta Foundation renovated the Alberta Hockey Hall of Fame (AHHF) with a \$13,000 facelift, including a splash of paint on the walls, a slick new floor and some other rearranging. In June, an additional transformation will occur to acknowledge the 2015 Alberta Hockey Hall of Fame Inductees. The AHHF is located in the Alberta Sports Hall of Fame and Museum, along Highway 2, in Red Deer.

## EVERY KID EVERY COMMUNITY
